What is summarising and why do we do it?

- It is expressing the main ideas of a piece of text in a concise way
- To know we understand the main ideas of what we have read

What makes a good summary?

- ✓ Short and concise!
- ✓ Includes the main ideas not lots of detail
- ✓ Should be in a logical order
- ✓ You can summarise a:

Setting or Character or Problem/Event
